During the week of December 11- December 17 the police department responded to 80 calls for service.

- 1) OB File #2011-4558
2011-12-12 @ 2041 hrs

The apartment manager in the 2100 block of Cadboro Bay Road contacted the police department regarding damage to the laundry room door and lock set. Approximate damage to the door is estimated at \$200.00. The laundry machines were not tampered with.

2011-12-13 @ 1716 hrs

A vehicle was parked in the underground parking lot in the 2600 block of Cadboro Bay Road. The rear window was smashed and nothing was stolen.

A citizen reported that his black Timex watch, prescription glasses and a pair of men's brown shoes were stolen from the OB Recreation Center pool change room cubby. The items were not locked in a locker. The investigation is ongoing to review the surveillance footage at the front counter to identify a suspect at the time of the theft.
